which would not only be helpful for their presentation, but also when a local high school or community theater has roles which require it.

How the vowel sounds are formed make a big difference.

"For the British accent, we are focusing on pure vowels, and not letting our American 'R's' color the vowel," she said.

Flamini Caldwell said the tongue curls in the American pronunciation of a word like "bird," but stays flat and relaxes to produce the British accent.

"It actually changes the vowel in addition to the ending consonant."

As the familiarity with the accent grew, the group of about 40 young performers sounded more and more like they were from London's East End.

Flamini Caldwell explained lyrics in some of the numbers would be "signed," not only for hearing impaired persons but also to help add expressiveness to the performance.

"We sign and sing," she noted. "The whole premise of the camp is expressive singing. Our hope is that they will put the expression both in their voices, but also in their bodies. The signing helps with that. It's amazing."

Caldwell led campers through rehearsals including Aubrey Spearling of Lewisburg, Madeleine Boerckel and Claire Castle. The preparation was fun, they said, but intense

"I was expecting a lot of singing," Boerckel said.
